1: Official royal motto of King Charles IX of Sweden



In Latin it reads: "*Iehovah solatium meum.*" This king was one in a line of several generations of rulers in Sweden, from 1560 to 1697, who highlighted God's name in Hebrew or Latin characters on coins, on medals, or in personal mottoes.

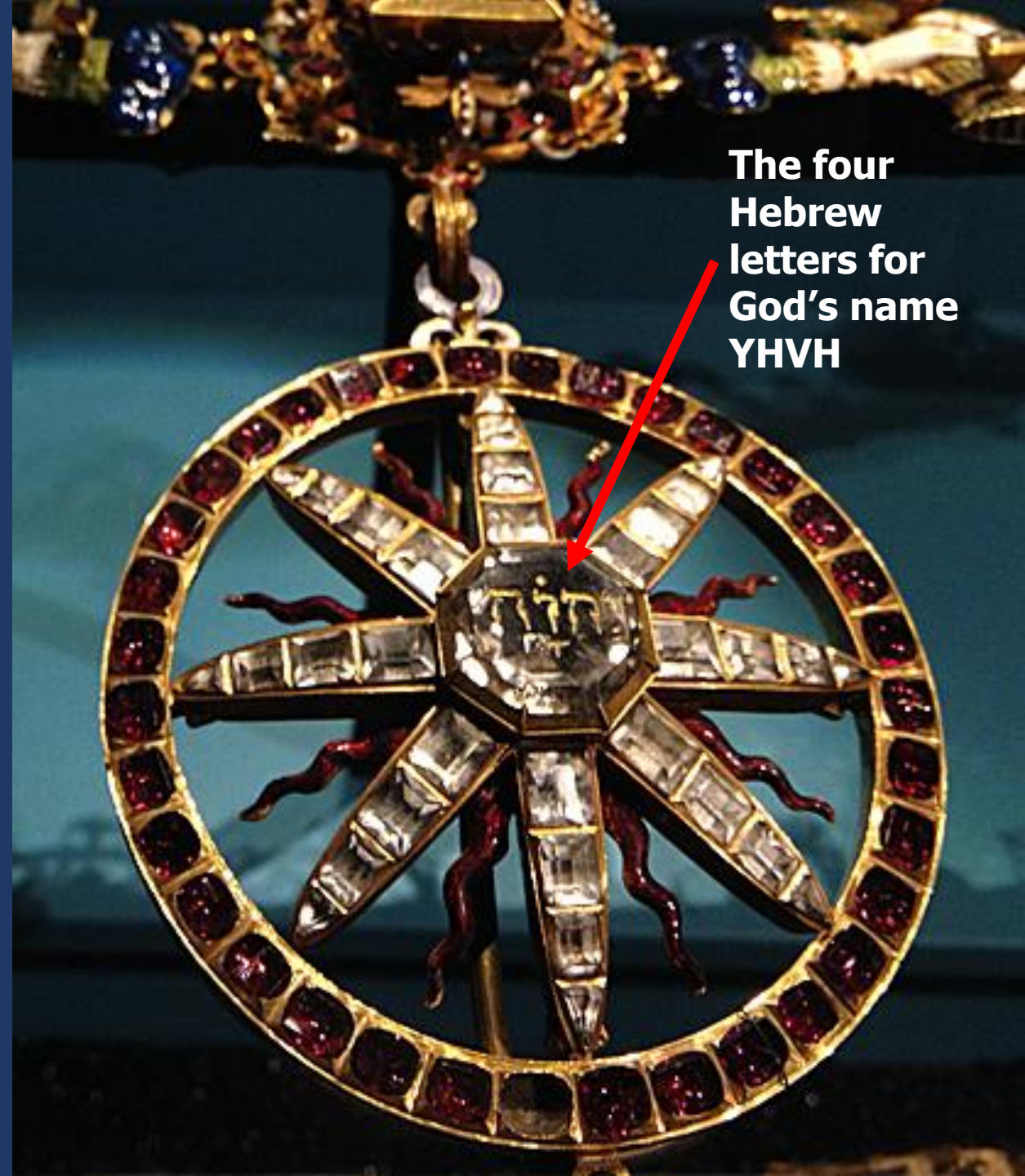
The photos show King Charles IX and his statue in the city of Gothenburg, Sweden. Above, the Swedish spelling of God's name at that time.

Charles IX: Royal Order of Jehovah

The Royal Order of Jehova was a Swedish dynastic order of knighthood instituted in 1606 by King Charles IX. The collar of the order was worn by the king.

What led these monarchs to such practices? Scholars believe that the Calvinist movement in Europe at that time, coupled with respect for the Bible, influenced them.

As well-educated Renaissance sovereigns, they were evidently familiar with the Latin version of God's personal name, Jehovah. Some no doubt realized that the name appeared thousands of times in the original Hebrew Bible text.

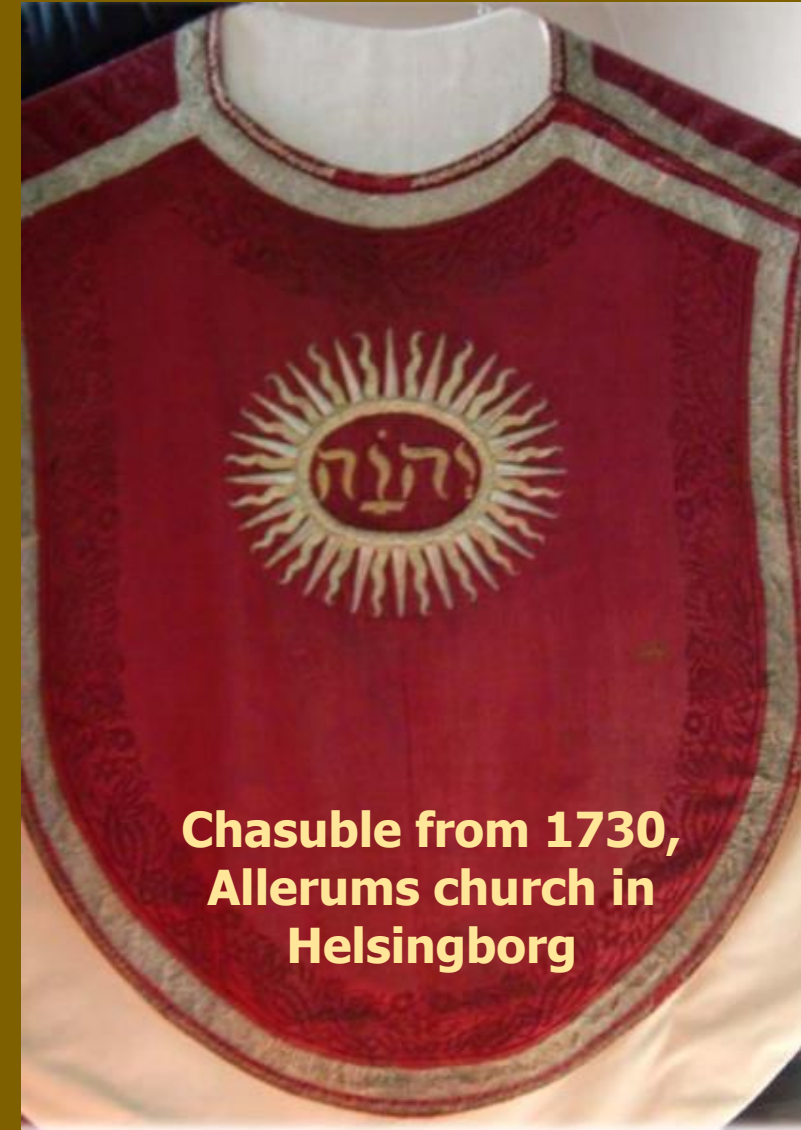
The homepage www.gudsnamnet.se displays photos

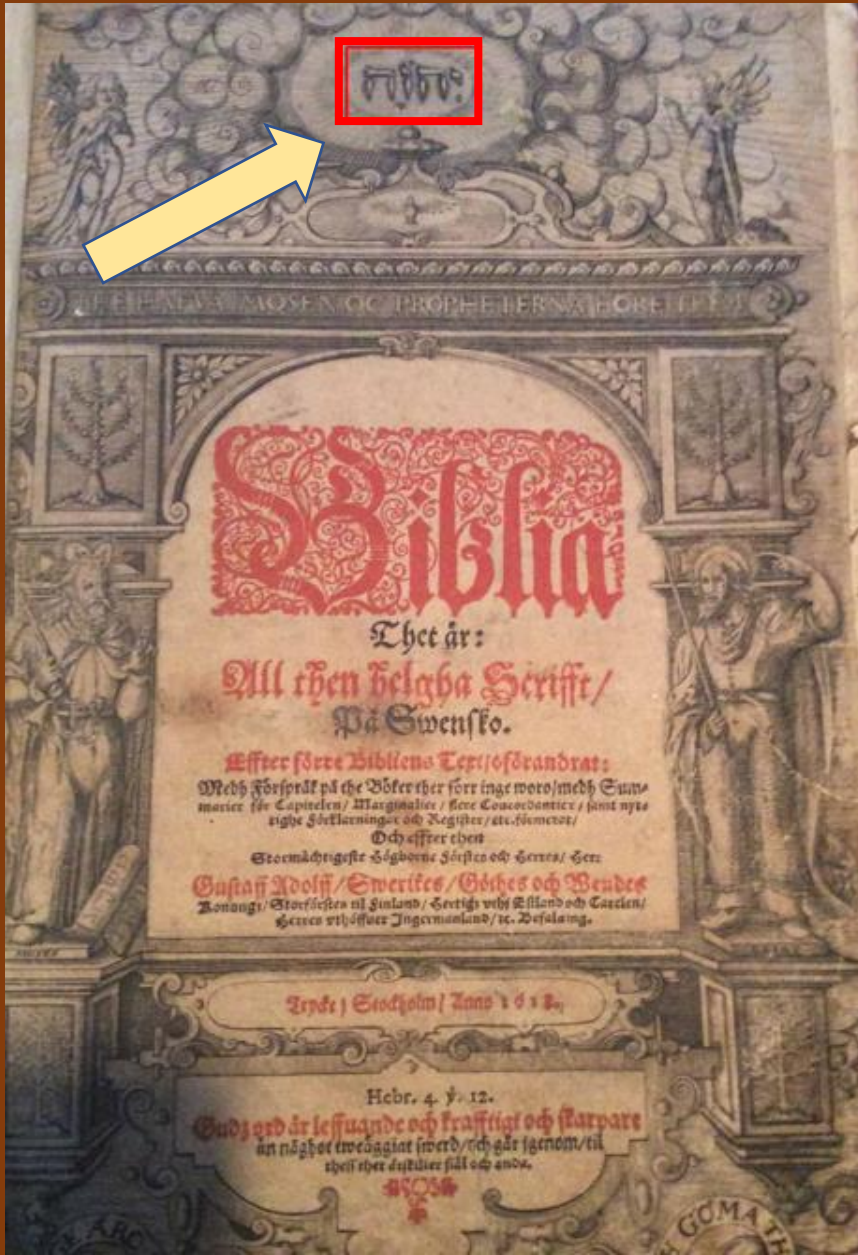

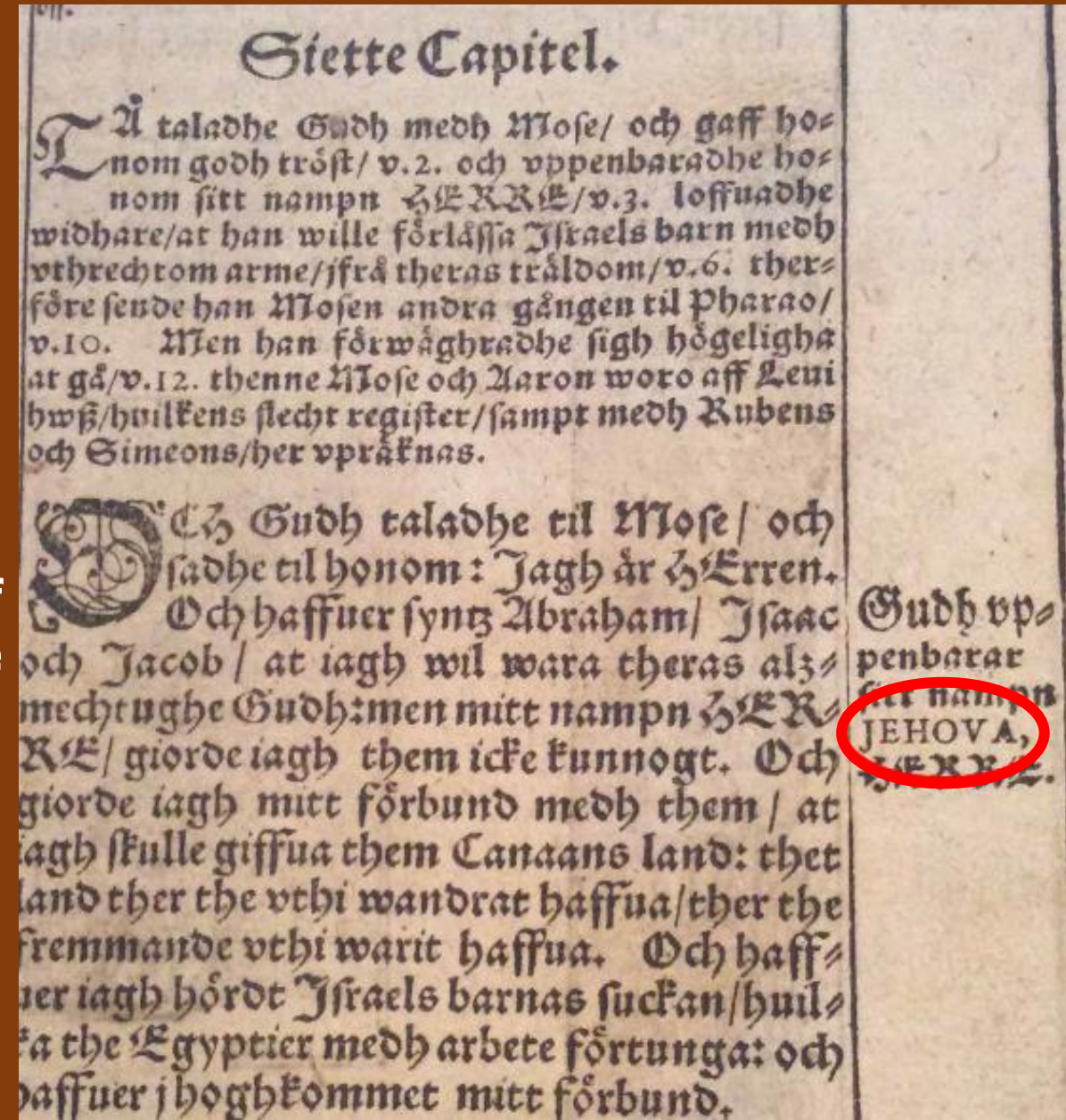

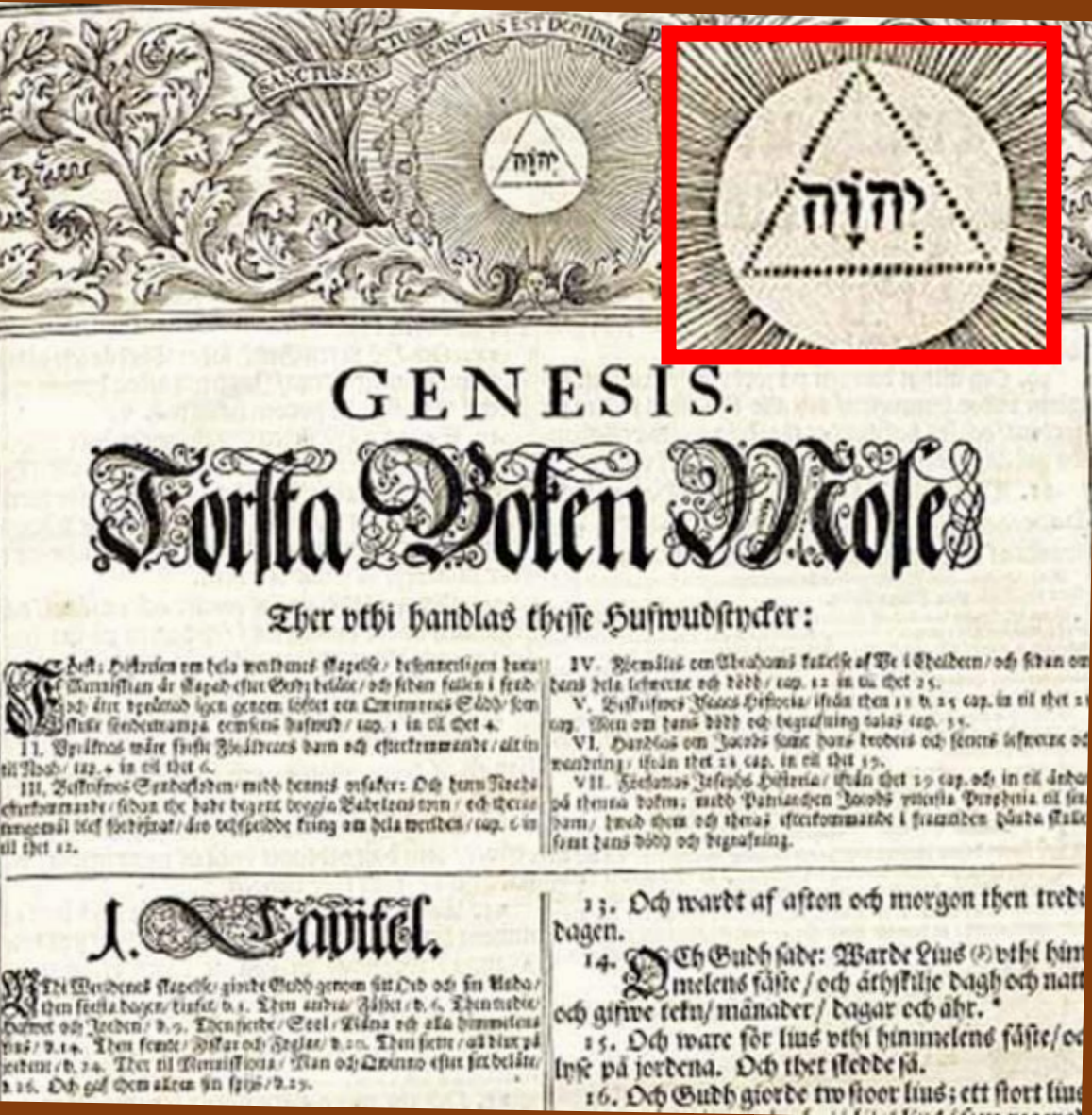

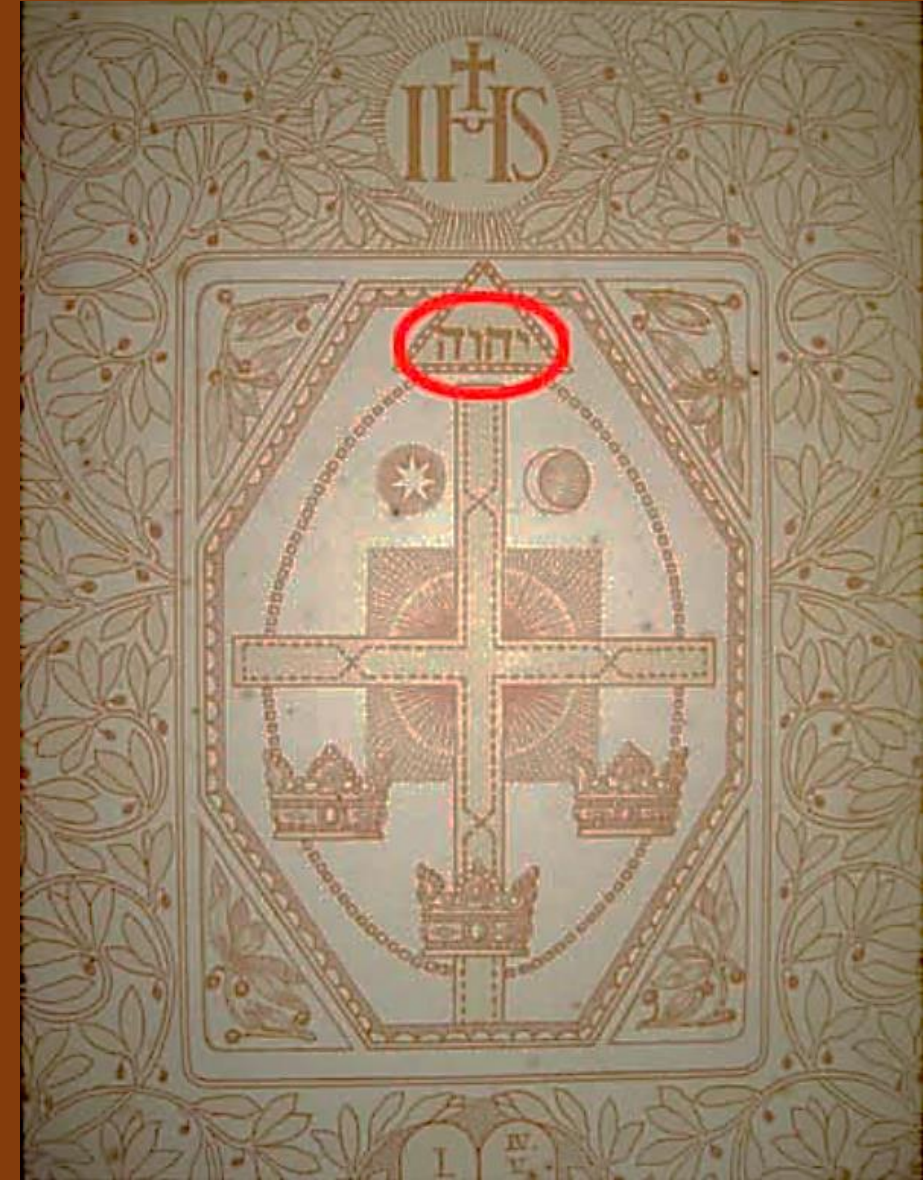

King Charles XII Bible from 1703.

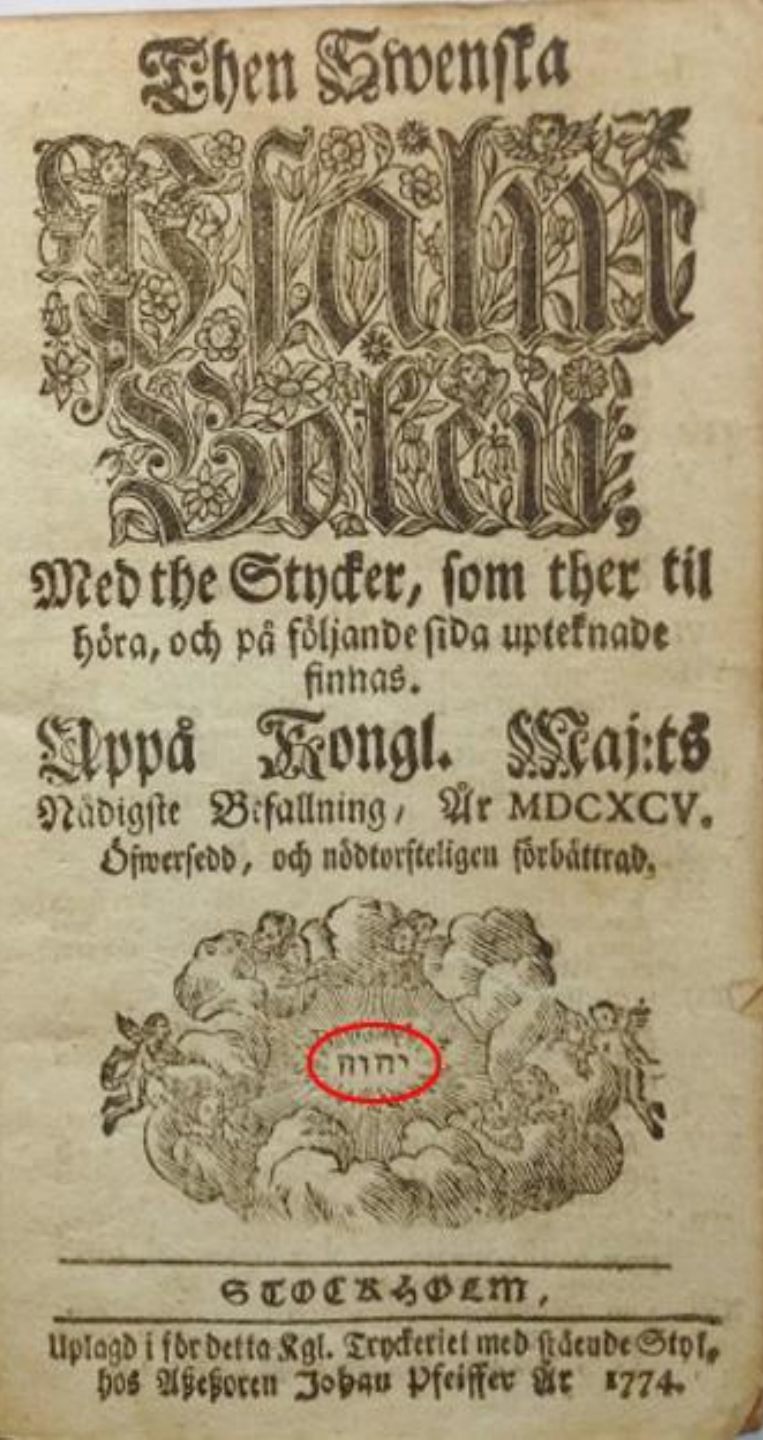
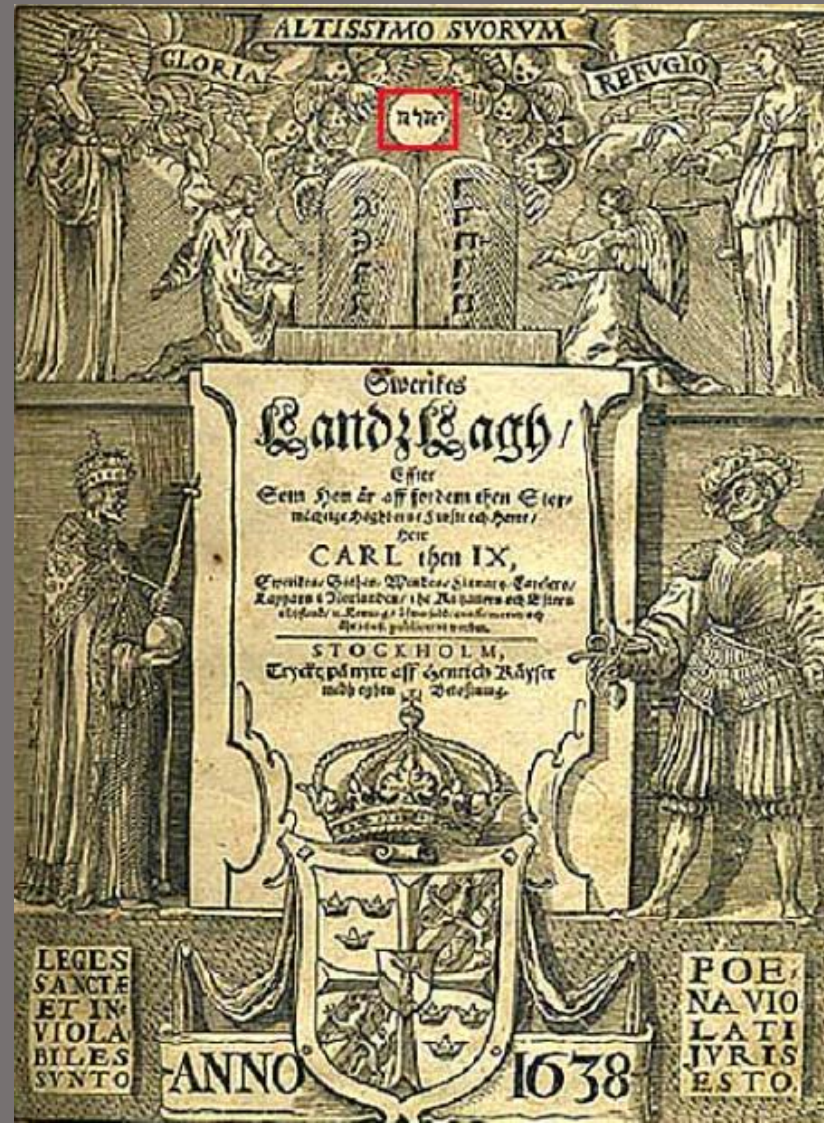


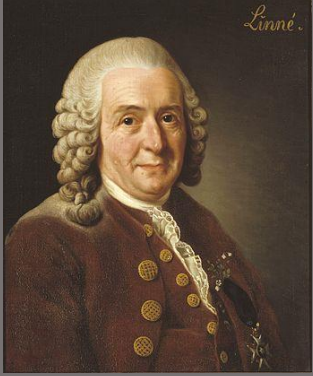
Illustrated family Bible from 1917

Example: Carl Linnaeus, 1707 – 1778

A Swedish botanist, physician, and zoologist who formalized the modern system of naming organisms. He is known as the "father of modern taxonomy".

The first edition of *Systema Naturae* was printed in the Netherlands in 1735. It was a twelve-page work. By the time it reached its 10th edition in 1758, it classified 4,400 species of animals and 7,700 species of plants.

The photo shows a quotation from Psalm 104:24 in Latin: "How many your works are, O Jehovah! You have made all of them in wisdom. The earth is full of what you have made." (New World Translation)

WHAT IT MEANS FOR YOU
